EDITOR'S MESSAGE





Seeing the Crystal Apricot and how it matched up with the Continental meant I needed it for a matching pair! The gentleman who owned it lived nearby in Montoursville and a few days later, the Mark V came home with me. This one would be the third Lincoln that I purchased after getting the collecting bug. The Williamsburg was first, followed by a 1979 Mark V Givenchy Designer Series, which deserves its own story (!!), and then this Mark V. It's been driven to a number of shows, including the Lincoln Homecoming in Hickory Corners and to Morgantown last year.

If you park a new car next to a 30's through 60's car and give us a choice 90% of us will jump into the old car and happily drive away. We know we are younger in that old car. That is the time we want it to be. We are taking control of this untouchable entity; we are winning a battle that we are always losing every moment of our lives.

I feel the soft breeze upon my face or the sting of dirt as I read a road test of the distant past. This is change in action, the obsolescence of something we liked and used, plus time.

Then stand in front of a floor length mirror with the picture in hand, need I say more? Young people reading this don't laugh, it's only a matter of time.

What we are trying to do mentally and psychologically is restore ourselves to better the new condition, just as we are doing to our old cars. I don't think we want to live forever, but as the years go by we find that at one time in the past we found our comfort zone in time. A place where you fit well, and the things around us felt and looked good to us. By reaching out to these things, old cars, radios, etcetera we surround ourselves with warm feelings of well-being. We are where we still understand things. Look under the hood of your new car, do you understand it all? Not like cars like from the 40's to the 70's and so it goes.

Our people are doing well handling the preservation of time. Go through a large store on any evening and observe how some people dress. How about the 60 something guy, bald on top, long hair in a bun, dressed in a Hawaiian shirt, bell bottoms, flip flops, and all three sizes too small. Next to him is his lady, leopard skin tights and 6-inch heels, you get my point.

A representative from the Amelia Island Concourse d'Elegance reached out to me in October of 2024 and asked if I would bring the 1956 Packard Convertible Caribbean to the 2025 show. I shared with them that the car wasn't completed yet and still needed quite a bit of stuff done. So the marathon began! Mostly every night after work I would spend several hours on the Packard detailing and finishing up the restoration project. The biggest hurdle was the convertible top that needed to be replaced. The top is a cream color and underneath is a whole second layer of material. That material is orange, similar to the exterior and interior colors. Literally the morning that the car was getting picked up to be transported to Amelia Island I was finishing the touch up paint in the engine compartment.

My wife and I flew down for the show and received the car the morning with the show from the transporter. We drove the car onto the show field/golf course which is strikingly beautiful. Luckily, we got down a day early as they decided to do move the show up one day due to the forecast of rain for the scheduled show day. If you ever get a chance to go to this show you should it's absolutely stunning the way they lay it out on the golf course and with the small ponds around the golf course. It makes for an incredible backdrop for a car show.

This 1956 Packard has a factory self-leveling system in the car that automatically keeps the car at the same height whether you sit in the car or put stuff in the trunk. They produced 276 convertibles and only three of them had factory air conditioning like this one. The seats are leather on one side and a beautiful mylar fabric on the other side. You can switch them depending on what your preference is of fabric or leather, and of course a push button transmission. The matching color of the inside of the convertible top gives this car a unique look with the top down. We were fortunate for the Packard to receive first in class.


